Professor of Anthropology, Health, and Global Affairs at Yale University since 2010. Initially schooled in French. M.A. Human Sciences, M.Sc. Human Biology, and PhD in Biological Anthropology from Oxford University.

Leadership

Head of Morse College: Chief administrative officer, responsible for the wellbeing of ~600 undergraduate students in residence and for fostering the social, cultural, and educational life and character of the college. *Hiring responsibilities:* Dean of College (2107) and Service Assistant (2017).

Interdisciplinary leadership: Medical Anthropology Senior Editor for *Social Science & Medicine*: Commissioning peer review and production of ~600 health-related manuscripts/year, to advance international knowledge bridging biomedical and social sciences health-related research. Research Scholarship

Directed more than 40 interdisciplinary research projects that address issues of risk and resilience in contexts of war, displacement, famine, and poverty. Fieldwork in Afghanistan, Ethiopia, the Gambia, India, Jordan, Nepal, Niger, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, Sri Lanka Tanzania, and the United Kingdom. Global collaborations with scholars at over 60 different universities in the last 4 years, established through fieldwork and publications.

Authored over 130 peer-reviewed scientific publications in the biomedical, health, and social sciences, and coedited seven books, most recently *Pathways to Peace* (MIT Press, 2014) and *Medical Humanitarianism: Ethnographies of Practice* (Pennsylvania Press 2015) - chosen by MSF Crash (a consortium interested in critical and engaged humanitarianism) for their summer reading list https://medium.com/@MSF_Crash/summer-reading-47b41c0ed05f.
